



The Surveillance Camera Commissioner has put a responsibility on Local Authorities to justify any deployment of surveillance cameras via a Data Protection Impact Assessment (Previously Privacy Impact Assessment - P.I.A). Such assessments are now required before deploying any new cameras and for assessing the continuing need for existing cameras. PIA's consider whether there is a justified need for the deployment of cameras, for example serious, frequent antisocial behaviour. It also considers the impact on those subjected to the surveillance, whether such actions are proportionate to the problem they aim to address and if other less intrusive measures have been considered e.g., improved lighting, gating, warden patrols, increased police patrols etc.

The system at Fleur De Lys is due for its annual review and I am contacting all relevant / interested parties for their views on CCTV to enable us to make an assessment on the continued use of CCTV. Attached are some statistical information for your area in previous 12 months 01/12/21 to 30/11/22

I notice in the figures you provided, that there has been just a small number of police requests to use footage gained from the CCTV camera in Fleur De Lys. I don't know how these figures compare with other areas, but the figures notwithstanding, most people I have spoken to support the continued placement of this camera at this location.

Furthermore, Cllr Heron and myself have discussed the CCTV provision at Fleur De Lys with the local police, and they told us they regarded this camera as invaluable, and want it to continue to be sited here.

To that end, I endorse its continued use at Fleur De Lys.

The same applies to CCTV Perm167 at Cefn Fforest. I note with this location, a slightly higher number of police requests and see that 4 DVD's were provided for evidential purposes.
