What is the proposal to be assessed? <i>Provide brief details of the proposal and provide a link to any relevant report or documents.</i>
The proposal is to close the Coffi Vista building and to cease the coffee shop operations. The building will then be marketed as an opportunity for the private sector. Allowing the operation to transfer to the private sector would reduce the subsidy burden and would bolster income through any rental agreed with a private operator. The toilet block should be closed off to public access, in light of the imminent introduction of toilet facilities at Ffos Caerffili. The proposal is to close the toilet block as this is assumed to be a more viable option for an incoming tenant. The existing tenant in the retail unit on the ground floor can remain in occupation until a new tenant is found. If they require both floors, then discussions will be had with the tenant to assist with the ongoing future of Y Galeri.

Who was consulted?

Engagement with staff is ongoing. The tenant of Y Galeri has also been engaged regarding this proposal and the potential impact on their business if the new tenant wishes to make use of the downstairs unit.

Members of the public will get the opportunity to express their views as part of the wider Budget Consultation.

Public Consultation will be at the end of January until the middle of February.

Update following a period of public consultation:

The council's public consultation on the draft budget proposals for 2024/25 ran from Monday 22nd January 2024 until Tuesday 13th February 2024.

Residents and other stakeholder groups were invited to offer their views on the proposals in a number of ways. This included a survey (available online and in paper formats), attending face-to-face engagement sessions, using the council's online digital engagement platform and targeted stakeholder engagement with potentially impacted groups.

337 responses to the consultation were received by the closing date. A low response rate such as this comes with the caveat of self-selecting bias in the response and local media has focused attention on a small number of issues.

Face-to face conversations have had low levels of attendance (less than 10 visitors per session) with the exception of Caerphilly where over 40 people attended. A meeting was held with 9 Viewpoint Panel members and one person attended an online drop-in session.

Through the survey responses, this proposal received both the largest number of responses for/in agreement with a proposal (131) and the largest number of responses against/in disagreement with a proposal (118). In addition, over 40 members of the public attended the Caerphilly Library drop-in session, with the majority there primarily to discuss the Coffi Vista proposal.

The responses for the proposal largely revolved around an appreciation that the facility is being heavily subsidised by the council and could be considered in a prime location for a private sector lease.

The responses against the proposal ranged from the warm welcome the staff at the centre provide, the impact on the staff being redeployed if the proposal went ahead, the community space/tackling isolation and loneliness, the public toilets and Y Galeri being important in promoting the Welsh language.

12. Reason(s) for Recommendation

The report and its outcomes are a direct response to the need to identify savings to contribute to the achievement of the Council's reduction in budget of c.£55m over the next two years. The closure of Coffi Vista represents a potential reduction in subsidy of £78,000 plus a potential income of £21,000 from letting the premises.

In comparison to other services provided by the Council, this is considered to be one with relatively low impact on the local population and should therefore be approved for closure.
